

Objectives

- encourage community involvement in all levels of SYRCA Saskatchewan Young Readers' Choice – The Willow Awards, Inc. activity;
- cooperate with other organizations and groups in order to maximize the use of limited resources

President's Report: The Willow Awards' Year, 2006-2007

The Willow Awards official year runs from April 1 to March 31. The spring of 2006 was highlighted by the 2005-2006 SaskEnergy Willow Awards Gala, which was held on May 12, 2006 at Lindale School in Moose Jaw. The Gala celebrates the winning authors and their books. Since the Awards are decided by children, it is important to SYRCA Inc that students are active in preparation, hosting and presenting the Awards. The Moose Jaw students were excellent hosts and performers. They were also an enthusiastic audience, waiting breathlessly for the announcement of the winners. We were delighted that all three winning authors were able to attend the event. The authors did readings in Regina and Moose Jaw.

The day after the Gala, the Willow Awards AGM was held, and new Board members and Executive were elected. The regular board meeting, held immediately afterwards, allocated duties, set up a timetable and dates for the year's meetings.

Requests for submissions from publishers were sent in the summer, and preliminary lists of eligible books established. The chairs of the selection committees recruited members and reading of the books began.

The official 2006-2007 Willow Awards Launch was held October 27, at Little Red River School, home to students from Montreal Lake Cree Nation and Lac La Ronge Indian Band. They welcomed guests from St. Louis and Sturgeon Lake Schools as well as parents and guests from Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert and North Battleford. They highlighted the books nominated for the 2006-2007 Willow Awards.

In an effort to save money on Board members travel expenses, two of the Board meetings were held by phone. Board members gathered at a location in either Regina or Saskatoon and used a speakerphone. With careful preparation and lots of patience this practice worked fairly well and was certainly cost effective. However, it is still necessary to meet face to face at least part of the time.

The selection committees presented their lists of titles nominated for the 2007-2008 Awards at the January 2007 Board meeting. After some discussion, it was decided to go with an alternative title for one of the Diamond Willow selections. Once again, a very strong list of nominees was selected, indicating the wealth of Canadian literature for young people.

As soon as the lists are confirmed, work began on printing the posters and bookmarks. Willow Awards members and participants were informed by email that the posters and bookmarks would be available at the spring conferences.

The Board debated the future of the Education Kits. The meager sales did not justify the work involved in producing them. Therefore, it was decided not to produce Education Kits in 2007. Activities and information about the author will be posted on the website throughout the summer. Book labels were reprinted with a new design, which was round and slightly smaller than the previous labels. It was decided to go with one design for all three awards.

Two very successful Fundraising Dinners were once again held in Saskatoon (February 23) and Regina (February 28). Despite blizzards on both evenings, the many participants had a wonderful evening. The Regina evening surpassed all previous records with over 130 tickets sold. The dinners require a lot of work by Board members and volunteers, but are essential to the funding of SYRCA Inc. and the Willow Awards.

The deadline for voting was February 28, 2007. Again, most votes were received electronically resulting in a much faster vote counting process. We were delighted that there was the highest number of votes ever this year.

This year the Board repeated the offer of various incentives to increase participation in the Willow Awards. A draw was made from the names of teachers and teacher-librarians who registered their classes. Six teachers or teacher-librarians received a box of books for their school or classroom. In addition, the names of ten students who voted in each of the three Willow Awards categories were drawn. The first names drawn in each category won a major prize. These students were invited to the Gala to receive their prizes. The other 27 students received a book prize that was shipped to them care of their teachers or teacher-librarians.

The Willow Awards participated in three conferences in Saskatoon this spring: Saskatchewan Reading Conference, the Saskatchewan School Library Association Conference and the Saskatchewan Library Association Conference. The new lists of nominated titles were presented at special sessions. Posters and membership forms were distributed. In addition, there was a Willow Awards table at the conferences. Willow Awards book labels were sold. It is important to have a presence at these conferences to promote the Awards in general and the new booklists in particular. Thanks to the Saskatoon Board members and volunteers who presented the sessions and sat at the tables.

Michael Keaschuk, Director of Chinook Regional System received a grant from SaskLearning to promote the Willow Awards in schools and libraries within his region. As a result, every school and public library in the Chinook Region received copies of all thirty of the Willow Awards books nominated for 2006-2007. They also purchased Education Kits and book labels for every location. Posters and bookmarks were


Awards increased from 11 communities in 2005-2006 to 27 communities in 2006-2007. Swift Current Public Library will also host the SaskEnergy Willow Awards Gala in 2007. The grant certainly made a difference in that region of Saskatchewan. Many thanks to Michael Keaschuk for initiating this project!

Despite extensive fund-raising efforts, the financial situation of SYRCA Inc. is currently bleak. This year, with reluctance we decided we could only afford to invite one of the winning authors to the Gala. The Board has discussed other cost-cutting measures. A letter explaining this situation was sent to members with their renewal notices and seems to be producing some good results. Board member Naomi Kral was able to secure new patrons in the Regina Leader Post and Saskatoon Star Phoenix as well as funding from the Saskatchewan Literacy Commission. Fund-raising is an ongoing challenge.

We also need to recruit more potential Board members and volunteers. Vice-President Carol Thiessen has made arrangements for a Board retreat in September to examine these and other issues with the help of an experienced facilitator. We hope that this project will ensure the long-term viability of SYRCA Inc and the Willow Awards.

I wish to thank my hard-working colleagues on the Board for all their support, especially Past-President Marion Perry for her invaluable guidance. Thanks also to the many volunteers who worked in various capacities throughout the year. Our patrons, The Book and Brier Patch, SaskEnergy, Regina Leader Post, Saskatoon Star Phoenix and Saskatchewan Literacy Commission, and our sponsors Saskatchewan School Libraries Association and National Book Service make the Awards possible and to them we extend our grateful thanks. I also would like to thank the teachers, teacher-librarians, public librarians and parents who encourage children to read and participate in the Willow Awards.

Fundraising is a major issue for the Willow Awards since the grant we received to start the awards is a one time only grant. SaskCulture was contacted to see if the Willow Awards were eligible for any other grants. However, this was unsuccessful. We continued to receive support from the Book and Brier Patch, and National Book Service.

We considered holding a special "Book Selling" event at Book and Brier or McNally Robinson, but decided that the effort involved would be unlikely to result in sufficient profits to make it worthwhile.

The two Fundraising Dinners and Silent Auctions proved to be successful and generate useful and substantial funds for the Awards. Increasing the price at the Regina Dinner and offering income tax receipts seemed to be a way to increase the revenue.

Raffles and sticker sales at the three spring conferences brought in a total of \$489.

I find we receive funding for literacy and the fact that this is a provincial project. Sometimes we are refused funding because the awards are provincial and not just for the local community.

Many people are out there beating the bushes for funding thus people pick and choose what they want to fund. Fund raising is a challenge that we must continue to work hard at and promote to continue with the activities associated with the Willow Awards.

Willow Awards' Web Page Committee Report, 2006-2007 www.willowawards.ca

The Willow Awards' website is updated regularly to reflect the annual cycle of Willow Award activities and events. The home page has featured the May 2006 SaskEnergy Willow Awards Gala at Lindale School in Moose Jaw, the October 2006 Launch at Little Red River School, and announcements such as those for the incentive draws available to teachers and students. The 2007 nominees have been posted. The page announcing the 2006 winners will be posted immediately after the Gala. The 2007 bookmark templates, ballots and vote summary forms will be posted in October. Since Education Kits have been discontinued, the goal is to provide generic activities for each award level. This material is required by September. More volunteers are needed to create learning activities.

This year the majority of votes were received via the online vote summary form. There were 286 forms submitted by 162 different teachers, librarians and parents, 63 communities were represented. The total number of votes, online and paper, was 8,057.

Trevor Cunningham from the U. of R. has been approached for advice regarding our website, and, in particular, about using a back-end database to support such areas as vote tabulation. Any changes will occur gradually as volunteers acquire new skills and find time to implement them.

Our web page is an extremely popular way for people to learn about the Willow Awards. The table below shows website activity from May 2004 up to April 26, 2007.

This year the committee considered 59 titles with an additional three titles rejected because of copyright date. The focus was on books for kindergarten to Grade 3. The committee balanced historical with contemporary, fiction with non-fiction, animal with non-animal, male with female, and younger readers with older readers. The committee also considered that the award is a literary award as opposed to an artistic award. With picture books the pictures are an important part of the presentation. This year as well as with individual readers, the committee had three reading families with at least one child in the target age group. The children had direct input in the book selection.

The committee would like to thank SYRCA for the opportunity to assist with this project.

In November, a Celebrate Literacy and Appreciation Tea was held to thank all the volunteers from the past three years who participated in the selection committees in Shellbrook. Pat Sonntag provided music with her harp, door prizes were enthusiastically received, and a short program was followed by lunch.

Snow Willow Selection Committee Report

The 2007 Snow Willow Selection Committee consisted of Carol Thiessen – co-chair, SYRCA board member, Florence Barton – co-chair, SYRCA board member, Ann Atchison, SYRCA board member, Kathy Sharman, library technician and retired SYRCA board member, Jane Glen, teacher librarian, Suseia Gordon, grade 7/8 teacher, Tim Gulutzan, grade 5 teacher, Laurie Hnatiuk, grade 6 teacher, Shona Iverson, teacher librarian, Kim Johnson, teacher librarian, Joe Geary, Young Adult librarian, Saskatoon Public Library, Michelle Pantel, grade 7/8 teacher, Sheree Rutherford, library technician, Susan Voitka-Seager, grade 5/6 teacher. All members are avid readers of YA literature.

We met 4 times during the selection process and considered about 120 titles. Publishers submitted many of the titles; however, our eager committee also suggested titles that had not been submitted. We read several 2005 titles to be certain we had the best representation possible. We created a spreadsheet that was updated and emailed to members regularly so they could request books they had not yet read and keep track of

books that had been eliminated. A rubric was created to provide a process for the readers to have consistent points for evaluation. Although we feel it needs revision, the committee members were generally satisfied with the rubric.

The books were distributed from Greystone Heights School. People also used the public library and Saskatoon Public School LRCs to access books. The selection process made obvious the narrow range of young adult titles that are suitable for the grade seven to nine Snow Willow category. Many of the excellent titles we read were considered to be too mature for promotion in elementary schools and were removed from our list because schools are our main area of promotion.

The 2007 selection committee enjoyed their work. We feel confident that Saskatchewan young adult readers will enjoy the ten nominated titles.
