President's Report: The Willow Awards' Year, 2007-2008

The 2007 SaskEnergy Gala was hosted by Swift Current Public Library and Art Gallery on May 25. For the first time, it was held in the evening. Classes from different schools presented dramatic interpretations of some of the nominated books. Due to financial constraints, we were only able to invite one winning author to the Gala. Lucy Falcone, Diamond Willow Award winner was presented with her Willow Award and also did readings in Swift Current.

The day after the Gala, the Willow Awards AGM was held, and new Board members and Executive were elected.

Requests for submissions from publishers were sent in the summer, and preliminary lists of books eligible for the 2007-2008 Awards prepared.

The official 2007 Willow Awards Launch was hosted jointly by Elizabeth School and Westberry School in Kindersley on October 18. Elizabeth School has participated in the Willow Awards since 2003 and each year their involvement and enthusiasm has increased. In 2006, several classes in another Kindersley school, Westberry School, also became involved in the Willow Awards. "O Canada" was both sung and presented by a group of students in sign language. Then pairs of students from different grades introduced the nominated books for each Award. Choral speaking, songs and readings of their own works by student authors entertained the audience between groups of books. The two student MC's did an excellent job of hosting the program. The young audience and presenters retired to their classrooms for well-deserved refreshments, while adult guests took some time to extend congratulations and take a closer look at the art on the walls.

A very important full-day Strategic Planning meeting was held in Regina on September 29. With the help of facilitators Marg Delainey and Rita Priestley, we identified our strengths and concerns, and brainstormed ways we might build on the former and address the latter. There is still a lot of ongoing work necessary, but we have laid the framework for future developments.

The Saskatoon Fund-Raising Dinner, Buffet and Books, was held in a new location on November 2. Having the Saskatoon Dinner in the fall and the Regina Dinner in the spring means that there is a more even distribution of funds raised throughout the year, which is very useful to SYRCA Inc. The Regina Dinner, Books at the Bistro, was held March 19, 2008. Both events were very successful at raising funds and the participants seem to enjoy themselves. They also provide an important social venue for Willow Awards friends and supporters to get together. Many thanks for the hard work to the Board members and volunteers who make all the arrangements.

The selection committees presented their lists of titles nominated for the 2008-2009 Awards at the January 2008 Board meeting. Once they were formally approved, the work of notifying publishers and authors, and producing posters and bookmarks begun.

The deadline for voting was February 29, 2008. Again, most votes were received electronically resulting in a much faster vote counting process. To our delight, we had a record number of votes, nearly reaching 10,000.

The Willow Awards had a table at the Saskatchewan Reading Council Conference and the Aboriginal Literacy Conference in Regina and the Saskatchewan School Library Association Conference in Saskatoon. The Saskatchewan Library Association Conference was a joint conference with the Manitoba Library Association Conference. Since it was felt that a large proportion of the delegates would not be interested in the Willow Awards, we did not have a table. However, Willow Awards posters and bookmarks were included in the conference kits. Thanks to the people who volunteered to set up and man the tables at these conferences.

Extensive fund-raising efforts had some success this year with new patrons Conexus, TD Waterhouse and PotashCorp. In addition new sponsors included SaskTel and Dr. Jacqui Shumiatcher. We have continued to watch expenses very carefully. Membership retention and recruitment is a priority and plans will be discussed in the near future.

The Willow Awards web-page and electronic voting required renovation and after discussing options presented by Past-President Marion Perry, the Board voted to hire a consultant to undertake the process. The work is being done in stages as we can raise funds to improve these areas and make them easier to use and less time consuming for our volunteers.

I wish to thank my hard-working colleagues on the Board for all their support. Thanks also to the many volunteers who worked in various capacities throughout the year. Our

Vice-President's Report - Ann Atchison

This year the role of Vice President has taken over the responsibility of being the contact person for the publishers, authors and illustrators, a responsibility previously undertaken by the Secretary.

In early June our Call for Submissions was sent to publishers requesting submissions for the 2008 Willow Awards. Keeping an up-to-date contact list of Canadian publishers and a contact person at each is somewhat challenging. I have endeavored to keep the database as current as possible.

After the Launch last October, a poster, a set of bookmarks, and a copy of the article that appeared in the Kindersley *Clarion* was sent to each of the authors and illustrators nominated for the 2007 Willow Awards. A letter thanking them for their contribution to Canadian children's literature was also included. Each author was asked if they would be willing to donate a signed copy of their book to be given to a student attending the Gala at North Park Wilson School. I had positive responses from almost all the authors and, as

a result, we received a number of books. I also received a number of notes and emails from the authors thanking us for all the work that we do.

In early February the publishers of the 2008 nominees were contacted to inform them of the nomination and request biographies, photographs and contact information for the authors and illustrators. A congratulatory email was sent to each of the authors and illustrators. All relevant permissions from publishers, authors, and illustrators were gathered. During the past number of years since our inception we have compiled an impressive database of contact information for Canadian authors and illustrators.





Fundraising Report – Willow Awards 2008

This year began with a bit of a challenge after we did some strategic planning for Saskatchewan Young Readers' Choice Awards - Willow Inc. At the planning sessions it was evident that we needed to do some serious fundraising to cover the operational expenses for the board and to find some extra capital to add a database to the website to make it more interactive as well as to archive some of the previous content.

It is imperative that we balance the funding from all areas of the province not just the major cities, since students benefit from all over the province. I think the Willow Board has done a good job in the manner of doing launches and galas for the awards in various regions of the province.

I made a concerted effort to obtain patrons and sponsors from various interest groups, banks, mining associations, agricultural, Aboriginal and industrial groups. Over 30letters were sent on an ongoing basis throughout the year. Claire and I applied to the Bill Gates, Foundation, and Literacy Network who receive funding from Raise-A Reader for grants to no avail!

In addition to writing letters and applying for funding grants in the fall Saskatoon held a dinner (buffet) and Silent auction at the Willows Golf Course one evening and in Regina for the sixth year at Alfredo's a dinner and Silent Auction were held in March to cover board expenses, poster costs and money to add the database to the website. The two events are major fundraisers for the awards and having them in different areas of the province and at a different time of the year help support the cause.

Work on the database is a one-time expense and very worthwhile to promote the Willow Awards. The board has been very frugal and cut back on a board meeting to save money and many decisions have been made electronically in the interests of economics.

After the strategic planning meeting it was suggested that we have a fundraising committee to mentor other members and to prevent someone from working in isolation. Since this is a provincial initiative funds should come from all areas of the province. I would be willing to chair a committee to help continue the cause for literacy for children in Saskatchewan. I think that SYRCA has taken some big steps this year and continued success is imperative to promote this wonderful project.

Saskatoon's 4th annual fundraising dinner "Buffet and Books' was held on Friday, November 2, 2007 at the Willows Golf and Country Club. This was Saskatoon's second fundraising dinner for the year. We wanted to try a fall dinner because the one in February seemed to conflict with people's winter holidays. We also changed venues and chose the Willows because of sharing the same name. For this fundraiser we offered tax receipts with each ticket sold. The tickets were \$35.00, with \$15.00 going towards a tax receipt, which included dinner, coffee and gratuity. We sold 120 tickets for the dinner, which was quite an increase from last three fundraisers. Each fundraiser has increased in attendance each year.

We had Anna Nissen playing the grand piano at the entrance to welcome people. There was a cash bar at 6:30 pm with the dinner beginning at 7:00 pm. We also added a guest speaker, Beverley Brenna, which gave a very enjoyable talk after dinner. One of Beverly books was in the Snow Willow category for this past year.

The silent auction was successful. We had 25 pre-packaged gift baskets, each of which included various items as well as several books. We cut our gift baskets by about half from our last fundraiser, but made each basket a little larger. We raised \$1683.00 from

The evening was a success. We brought in around \$4300.00 not including the memberships.

Willow Awards' Web Page Committee Report, 2007-2008 www.willowawards.ca

In 2007, the Willow Awards' website provided excellent resources related to the nominated books. Full-text booktalks were added for most of the nominated books. Thank you to Chris MacLennan for all her hard work creating these. Some of the nominated books also had a link to the "Comprehending the Willows" website. Thanks to Susan Holmes and Rhonda Wills, teacher-librarians with the Regina Public School Division, who created this site. Thanks also go to Darcie Gerein and Deb Mervold for creating activities for the Shining Willow nominees and to Florence Burton, Ann Atchison and Carol Thiessen for activities related to the Snow Willow Books.

At the October 2007 Board Meeting, a motion was passed to engage Trevor Cunningham of Bradly Martin Creative to restructure the website. Much work has occurred to move to an open source content management system called MODx. Moving to this framework will allow for web-based editing of the content (updating pages from right within the web

browser), a search function for the website, the ability to schedule publishing, and will make it much simpler to facilitate the forms and desired voting functionality. The system itself is template driven, which makes it easier to implement changes while ensuring consistency in layout and presentation. The new site should soon "go live". The design is simple; the most dramatic changes are behind the scenes – updating will be much simpler, and results will be consistent with established pages. There is potential for a much more interactive site. It is my hope that we will continue to have funds to improve the site and that we pursue a partnership with Bradly Martin Creative to take it even farther.

Again this year, the majority of votes were received via the online vote summary form. Thank you to Mary Saso for managing the word@willowawards.ca e-mail and for collating all the e-mail results.

Our committee previewed two hundred and four books in total this year. Fifty-three of the books were published in 2006, two were republications, one was published in 2005 and the remainder were published in 2007. We received books from thirty-one publishers. A number of books were considered inappropriate for this level and were passed on to either the Shining or Snow Willow committees. We had a strong selection of nonfiction books this year. Very few books with Aboriginal content were submitted. In addition to books received from the publishers, members of the committee suggested several titles. Claire Isaac assisted us by compiling a list of eligible books.

Our committee met four times beginning in late June. Cheryl was able to make arrangements to have the books stored at J. S. Wood Public Library so that the committee would have easy access to them. A spreadsheet of the books was compiled as they arrived and emailed to the committee members. After each meeting the list was amended to assist the readers in their reading. A rubric was used as part of the evaluation process.

In mid January the committee met to make their final decision. Care was taken to ensure that books had a wide appeal to both boys and girls. We believe that the list offers a variety of reading levels and genres. We would like to thank our committee for all their hard work reading and evaluating the books. Their insightful comments and experience working with children played a critical role in the decision making process. Without their able assistance we would not be able to continue.
