REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT, SYRCA INC.

The SYRCA Board of Directors met in May, September, November, January and March of this fiscal year 2008 - 2009. A considerable amount of time was spent developing a Strategic Plan that will help provide direction for the SYRCA board for the next 3 - 5 years. The Priorities for 2008-2009 outlined in this plan are found on page 3. The complete Strategic Plan can be found on the "About SYRCA" page of our website, www.willowawards.ca.

The goals in the priority areas of Organizational Structure and Fiscal Responsibility represent an annual "to do" list for the board to address at the first meeting of the year. The organization has a strong structure with well defined policies and procedures. We were successful this fiscal year in building a reserve fund that will provide the organization with a small cushion if fiscal resources decrease due to economic restraint. Our fundraising committee, chaired by Naomi Kral, has been very active in seeking funds from corporate donations. The decision to create new levels of patrons reflects the corporate support we received this year. We continue to seek grant sources and long-term, stable funding sources for our organization and take every opportunity to grow the membership in SYRCA.

Communication is a major priority for SYRCA. This year the website, http://www.willowawards.ca, has undergone significant change. The web committee, chaired by Marion Perry, worked with website developer Trevor Cunningham to add an online voting feature, a board login page and an updated look. This has improved communication with our members and readership and has provided another means of internal communication. The newsletter is a priority that requires significant attention in the next year. Difficulties in getting the newsletter produced have meant time delays and errors. Other communication priorities and goals such as posters and bookmarks and media coverage have been met.

Sustainability is identified as a priority. It is the long term goal of the board to hire an executive co-ordinator to help manage the work load. Expanding the membership and volunteer base are ongoing goals.

Programming was identified as a strength of our organization. The selection committees work effectively and the educational activities on the website are visited frequently. We piloted a multi-site launch in October and will continue with that format in the fall, followed by an evaluation. The Gala was hosted by Lumsden Elementary School and was a wonderfully celebratory event.

In conclusion, the 2008 – 2009 year for Saskatchewan Young Readers' Choice Awards was productive and successful thanks to the many hours spent by the volunteer Board of Directors. I would like to thank each of them for their time, their talents and their endless enthusiasm for fulfilling our mandate of promoting literacy to the young readers of our province. Reports will follow outlining the work of various board members.

REPORT OF VICE-PRESIDENT ANN ATCHISON

As Vice President one of my main responsibilities is to act as the contact person for publishers, authors and illustrators. In addition to this, I have also worked on the organizing committee for the Saskatoon fund-raiser, Buffet and Books, and served as co-chair, with Cheryl Smith, of the Diamond Willow Selection Committee.

In early June our Call for Submissions was sent to publishers requesting submissions for the 2009 Willow Awards. I have endeavored to keep our database as current as possible and I have developed a distribution list to assist in the process of distributing information to the publishers.

In early January, a letter containing a poster and set of bookmarks was sent to each of the nominated authors and illustrators thanking them for their contribution to Canadian children's literature. Authors were asked if they would be willing to donate a signed copy of their book to be given to a student attending the Gala at the Lumsden Elementary School in Lumsden. Twenty-four authors responded by sending at least one signed copy of their book. Two of the authors sent two copies and another author sent a box of postcards and fridge magnets in addition to two signed copies of her books. These were given to Janice Schmitz who looked after distributing them to the students who attended the Gala. I also received a number of notes and emails from the authors thanking us for all the work that we do.

In early February, the publishers of the 2009 nominees were contacted to inform them of the nomination and request biographies, photographs and contact information for the authors and illustrators. A congratulatory email was sent to each of the authors and illustrators. All relevant permissions from publishers, authors, and illustrators were collected. Information was forward to Val Gerrard who looked after putting it on the website.

In early March I contacted each of the winning authors to inform them that their book had been selected as one of the winners of the 2009 Willow Awards. Unfortunately only one of the authors, Caroline Adderson, was able to attend our Gala. Both Melanie Watt and Gordon Korman had previous commitments.

This has been a challenging year for SYRCA. We have had a number of resignations from the Board. This has meant more work for those of us who have remained. I would like to thank all of the SYRCA board members for their work during the past year. Your work on developing our Strategic Plan has given us direction as we move into the future. The hard work of the Fund-raising Committee has ensured that we do have a future. Thank you to each and every one of you for your commitment and dedication. In addition, I would also like to thank all of our members, friends, patrons and sponsors. Without you, SYRCA – The Willow Awards Inc. would not be viable today.



FUNDRAISING REPORT 2009

Goal - Strategic Plan: Ensure sufficient funding for sustainability

At the beginning of the 2008-2009 year, the fundraising committee consisting of board members Claire Isaac, Ruth Garnett, and Naomi Kral, began a provincial letter writing campaign to solicit donations to support Saskatchewan Young Readers' Choice - The Willow Awards Inc. Since our mandate is to encourage children in the province to read Saskatchewan and Canadian authors, the committee approached people from various sectors instead of concentrating on the two larger cities to fund this provincial initiative.

The letter writing campaign focused on obtaining funding for a database to be added to the Willow Awards website to make it more interactive, to count the students votes electronically, and to archive some of the previous content.

In the fall Regina Board members hosted a brunch to launch the new book titles for 2009 and to thank some of the past sponsors. Conexus Credit Union provided funding for the brunch and became the title sponsor in the amount of \$3000 dollars. As the committee organized the brunch, I received a letter from the Literacy Commission informing us of a donation of \$5,000 dollars to help build the database. Shouts of joy erupted from the audience when this generous donation was announced at the brunch. One of the web committee wept with delight! The new work began immediately and by December the website was enhanced. The number of hits on the website to record the interactivity and the comments about the new and improved website indicate it is well used! The goal to achieve funding to improve the website and promote the Willow Awards was met this year.

This year we were fortunate to receive these two significant donations but as the interest grows the workload continues for a few. Regina held a Brunch and A Silent Auction and Dinner this year; I am not sure if we can continue this feat again next year without more manpower. Saskatoon held a Silent Auction and Dinner as well.

The strategies to seek additional corporate sponsorships and maintain current sponsorships were achieved, and SYRCA became more secure financially. The Willow Awards was extremely grateful to a number of returning sponsors and to the newspapers (Leader-Post and Star Phoenix) that continued to provide support by advertising the new titles for the brunch in Regina and the dinner in Saskatoon.

Claire sought other grant sources and renewed previous grants.

FUNDRAISING: SASKATOON BOOKS AND BUFFET



PROGRAM: VOTING REPORT 2008-2009

Goal - Strategic Plan: To revamp the online voting process to make it easier to use for both the teachers/teacher-librarians and for the Board.

The new online voting system proved very popular. There were very few paper votes. All votes were tallied in less than 30 minutes. The online process makes the whole procedure much faster and also facilitates the collection of statistics.

Goal - Strategic Plan: To increase the total number of votes, the number of participating communities and the number of participating schools.

Achieved.

For the first time, the number of votes exceeded 10,000. This is an increase of 4% over last year. The number of communities also reached the highest yet (77), an increase of 13% over last year. The number of schools is 9% higher than last year, but still falls short of the number achieved in 2006. In addition, this year had the greatest number of teachers and teacher-librarians participating in the Willow Awards.

Draws for prizes for 10 students who participated in voting in each of the three Willow categories were made. In addition, draws were made for teachers/teacher librarians who participated. They were sent boxes of books.

Goal -Strategic Plan: Maintain and enhance the current website

In 2008 the Willow Awards' website was completely restructured and now operates on MODx, an open source content management system. The new system is template driven, which allows easier implementation of changes and ensures consistency in layout and presentation.


With the new system and the hard work of Trevor Cunningham, our website developer, we were able to realize our goal of implementing a backend database to manage the information that arrives through the website. The database saved many volunteer hours by automatically tallying votes from the vote summaries entered by teachers and by sorting and storing contact information so that the results and prizes could be sent to participating schools and students. The database also facilitated other applications such as managing submissions of Launch Activities and applications to host the Gala.

As the yearly Willow Awards' cycle moved from selection, to nomination, reading, voting, and finally the awards, the website reflected the changes. The Nominated Books Page was updated and the 2008 pages were moved to the Archives Page. The Student Projects Page was updated with the Power Point presentation of *Scaredy Squirrel* and other the Launch activities submitted by schools. Accounts and photos from the two Galas held in this fiscal year were created and posted on the Event Reports Page. Content was added and edited on the Ballots and Forms, Newsletter, Our Supporters, and About SYRCA pages. The

Home Page was re-designed and published with the release of the 2009 nominees. Two new pages were added this year. The News Page contains updates and photos of activities related to the Willow Awards and includes a RSS Feed where people can sign up to be notified of new postings. The Board Login Page contains policy and other information for the Board and facilitates communication among board members

Thanks to everyone who contributed content for the website. In particular I would like to thank Trevor Cunningham, our website developer, and Val Gerrard and Kathy Stedwill who generously donated their time to develop, update and maintain the content of the site.





PROGRAM: SNOW WILLOW SELECTION COMMITTEE REPORT

The Snow Willow committee consisted of 12 members, who as a group chose 10 titles from books that were published in 2007/2008 and submitted. We read and considered 146 titles in all: 48 titles that were held over from 2007, and 98 titles that were published in 2008. Another 20 titles, also published in 2008 were late submissions, which will be included in our list of considerations for the 2009 Snow Willow nominations.

The group had meetings in September, November, December and January, with a majority of the group able to attend all meetings. In order to facilitate conversations, a wiki which allowed members to post and share opinions and reviews of titles was developed. The wiki was also a good format to allow members from both Saskatoon and Regina to participate in all book discussions.

This year our committee previewed one hundred eighty-six books. Fifty-seven books were published in 2007 and one hundred twenty-nine were published in 2008. Some of the books, which were deemed unsuitable for our age group, were forwarded to either the Snow Willow or Shining Willow committees for their consideration. Twenty-one books were held for consideration by next year's committee. Some of these arrived too late to be given proper consideration and others were deemed by the committee to merit reconsideration.

The committee met four times beginning in September. Cheryl arranged to have the books stored at J. S. Wood Public Library. A Wiki, listing all the books with links to reviews, was set up for so that committee members could post comments on the books as they read them. This was not as well used as it might have been but those who used it found it to be a valuable tool. After each meeting, the list was amended to assist the committee members in their reading. A rubric was used as part of the evaluation process.

In mid January the committee met to make their final decision. We believe that the nominated books cover a good range of reading levels, genres and interests. Unfortunately, we were not able to include a book with Aboriginal content as there were very few books with Aboriginal content submitted. This continues to be problematic at this level.

We would like to thank our committee for all their hard work reading and evaluating the books. Their insightful comments and experience working with children played a critical role in the decision making process. We would also like to thank Claire Isaac for compiling a list of eligible titles. All this work could not be done without a dedicated group of readers.
